We are thrilled to announce the extension of our "Jean Vendome, Artist Jeweler" exhibition until August 28, dedicated to this true pioneer of modern jewelry and lover of minerals, which he never ceased to celebrate through his unique and daring creations.

We hope that many of you will be able to discover this exhibition, whether in person **in Paris** or through our digital promenades, videos and photo galleries, available online on our website!

In addition, in our effort to adapt to everyone's schedules, we are announcing the creation of a new format: short course cycles. Our first cycle, devoted to "artist's jewelry", will take place over 5 sessions, every Tuesday evening in June, from 7:00 to 8:30 pm. It will be led by two art historians who will take you to the core of art history, collecting and emotion.

Simultaneously, **in Hong Kong**, the second permanent campus of L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts is presenting the exhibition "The Art of Gold, 3000 Years of Chinese Treasures". Through a selection of masterpieces from the Mengdiexuan collection, this exhibition takes you on a journey through Central Asia, the Eurasian Steppes, Mongolia and the Himalayas, over a period of more than three millennia, to discover ancestral savoir-faire that still fascinates us today.



And of course, we will also continue our program of free **online** Conversations open to all. From May to July, we will offer two Conversations per month, from the French Crown Jewels to Gold Craftsmanship, from Women Jewelers Designers to Silver Through Time. Our Conversations are broadcasted live from Paris or Hong Kong, in French and English, with translations in Mandarin and Cantonese, to be more accessible wherever you are in the world, and whatever your nationality and language.

Artist's Jewelry

An odyssey at the heart of art history, collection and emotion.

Like a miniature work of art, an artist's jewel has a special relationship to the body and intimacy, because it is the only artwork that a collector can wear. Very often created by artists for their muse, their partner or their children, it is an object of love endowed with a particular emotional charge. Picasso collected pebbles on the beach for Dora Maar and painted them. The intensity of artistic creation is thus tied in these works with the gesture of passion.



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Study day co-organized by L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts at the Centre Pompidou in relation to the "Elles font l'abstraction" Exhibition

What role did women play in the emergence of abstract jewelry in the 20th century?

While the essential contribution of artists such as Sonia Delaunay (1885-1979) and Sophie Taeuber-Arp (1889-1943) to the development of abstraction is recognized today, the hypothesis of a feminine tendency towards the non-figurative in the field of jewelry arts seems seductive, in view of the numerous jewelry creations that appeared in the first half of the 20th century.

This tendency to abstraction, sometimes radical, is often coupled with a certain form of openness, a decompartmentalization of the arts, which testifies to the training, the pathways and the fields of activity of these creators. Trained in professional technical schools or art schools, from the world of jewelry or decorative arts, specialized in jewelry or practicing other art forms in parallel, they present a diversity of faces and profiles, which contributed to the richness of abstract jewelry creation in the 20th century.

In tandem with the exhibition "Elles font l'abstraction" (Centre Pompidou, May 5 - August 23, 2021), this Study Day will seek to question the place of women artists in jewelry creation of the 20th century and highlight their contribution to abstraction. Lastly, to question the way in which art history is written.

Jean Vendome Artist Jeweler


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Jean Vendome, whose real name was Ohan Tuhdarian, created his first jewelry collection in 1950, and worked tirelessly right up until his death in 2017. His multifaceted talent combined eccentric and surrealist elements with contemporary graphic design, giving his jewels a refined and intricately designed appearance.

Until August 28th, L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts brings to light the universe of this adventurous creator, who, as a true artist, set about creating his own world. He bucked fashion trends with his own personal and pioneering style. Simple yet sophisticated, powerful yet intricate, eccentric yet well-designed, constructed and deconstructed, Jean Vendome's jewelry is always emotional. In order to be appreciated fully, it must be loved and understood, as it is the jewelry that chooses the wearer.

A special issue of the magazine *Connaissance des Arts*, dedicated to the exhibition, will be given to all visitors to guide them during their visit.

The private collections on display emphasizes the visionary side of his creations. One hundred and thirty pieces are on show, including Aléna Caillois' wonderful necklace. The retrospective also features pieces from public collections at institutions including the Paris Museum of Decorative Arts, as well as the sword of the academician Roger Caillois, on special loan from the Musée des Confluences in Lyon.



The exhibition showcases a wide range of his pieces. Visitors are able to retrace his innovative exploration of shapes and his avant-garde approach to changing scale and traditions in order to adapt his jewelry for the modern and liberated women of the 1970s. Jean Vendome's prolific creations resonate like a poetic and meaningful echo of the major artistic movements of the second half of the 20th century.

From kinetic pop art to the dream of the Apollo 13 space mission, his jewelry pieces evolved into *Constellations, Aurore Boréale* and *Espace* during the 1970s. The geometric shapes of the skyscrapers in Les Tours betray his passion for urban architecture and the race upwards. The 1980s were the years of "imaginary walks", where he played on the mimetic analogy of agates, fragments of eternity, and matte and polished gold jewels with "phantom" quartz, rutilated quartz and dendritic agate. The 1990s are marked by the use of ever stronger colors, which Jean Vendome called his "vagrant" or "wild" colors. It was a time of escapism and dreaming.

A sculptor in search of fascinating inclusions, radiance, materials and colors, Jean Vendome, alchemist and jeweler, will never cease to amaze you.

Discover 4 masterpieces of the exhibition:

Hammering and Chasing

This U-shaped neck ornament is formed from substantial sheets of cast and hammered gold. A narrow section of the gold sheet is bent inwards along the inside curve of the ornament to form a raised 'collar'. Chased onto the surface are two robust birds, their heads depicted in profile at the blunt ends of the ornament, with hooked beaks and turquoise-inlaid eyes. A complex series of fanciful curls and scrolls vaguely suggesting the birds' bodies, wings and tail feathers extends towards the center, marked by a third turquoise inlay. Two square holes at each of the blunt ends served for attachment. Its surface is smooth and polished.

"The Art of Gold, 3000 Years of Chinese Treasures"

T ravel through time to witness the imperishable radiance and lasting power of gold, as it has played a symbolic and decorative role since the 5^{th} millennium BCE.

Featuring a selection of masterpieces from the Mengdiexuan Collection, the exhibition illustrates over three thousand years of goldsmithing in China, through four major techniques namely hammering and chasing, casting, granulation, wire and filigree. From necklaces, bracelets and earrings, to hairpins, brooches and belt plaques, they take visitors on a journey across central China, the Steppes, Mongolia and the Himalayas, spanning three millennia from the Shang dynasty to the Qing dynasty, presenting the goldsmithing techniques that still intrigue connoisseurs' eyes in modern times.

Gold neck ornament or pectoral.

The stag lays with its legs folded underneath its body. Its antlers take the form of rings and reach all the way to its tail. It is made of cast gold. Stags with similarly coiled antlers were a popular motif on ornamental plaques from the sixth to fourth century BCE throughout the Eurasian steppes as far as Inner Mongolia and north China.

Granulation

The half-moon shaped comb top features a similar design of mandarin ducks and floral motifs executed in the same manner, and may have been worn in combination with a headdress, assessing from similar gold ornaments recovered from the Tang dynasty tomb of Princess Li Chui.

Wire and Filigree

This hairpin features mythical bird-beast motifs hammered and chased from gold sheets. The filigreed head shows a four-clawed dragon issuing from a tubular socket and chasing a flaming pearl among cloud scrolls accented with two red gemstones.



PORTRAIT OF A TEACHER

Gislain Aucremanne Jewelry Historian



A word about your professional career? How did you arrive in the jewelry world?

At the age of 5, my mother took me to discover the Louvre Museum for the first time and my passion for art was born. As a young student at the Ecole du Louvre, I was able to study the great civilizations, the history of styles and collections, and the cultures of the past. I was particularly interested in the great goldsmith's treasures of Antiquity (Egypt, Mesopotamia, Greece and Ancient Rome), which were my first steps in the world of historic jewelry.

After my studies, I entered the fascinating world of museums, where I was able to put my knowledge of art history into practice through lectures, large exhibitions and many other cultural events. Very quickly, my interest in jewelry became a specialty in its own right, from the French Crown jewels in the Louvre to the Art Nouveau creations at the Musée d'Orsay, passing through the "jewelry gallery" of the Paris Museum of Decorative Arts, but also within the great heritage retrospectives of the Maisons of Bulgari and Cartier at the Grand Palais.

When and how did you become a professor at L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts?

Shortly before Christmas 2011, I received an email from a cultural agency with whom I was already working on jewelry topics, and what was written aroused my curiosity: "Good evening Gislain, a major jewelry Maison is going to create a great educational project that will surely interest you... but I can't tell you more. If you're interested, meet me on this day at this address! ". Faced with such an opportunity, I reserved my day and that's how I was able to meet Marie Vallanet-Delhom, today president of L'ÉCOLE. The adventure started for me with the launch of L'ÉCOLE, on February 14, 2012, and I have had the privilege to see it grow and travel to meet audiences around the world in order to share my passion for jewelry with other jewelry lovers.

Which courses are you teaching? Do you have a favorite course?

As an art historian I teach all of the jewelry history courses, work on several educational and cultural projects in Paris and abroad, and speak very frequently at our Conversations, whether to an audience or streamed live online (as it is the case today).

It is very difficult for me to choose one course from those on the history of jewelry at L'ÉCOLE, as I have often had the privilege of participating in their creation. Art Nouveau Jewelry is perhaps my favorite, as it traces the history of not only a style, but an era. This recontextualization allows us to see how jewelry is linked to aesthetic and societal changes. The 1900 era was, moreover, the moment when jewelry was really considered as an *objet d'art* in its own right, which is fundamental in the history of art!

And to finish, can you tell us what is your favorite jewel?

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Choosing a single piece is always complex, but I think my heart leans towards an Art Deco piece like this bracelet from the Maison Lacloche. I find the 1920s one of the most incredible periods in the history of fine jewelry, both in terms of the sources of inspiration and the quality of the craftsmanship involved. This taste, said to be "modern", was able to adapt to the most geometric, even abstract forms, while including varied influences: India, China, Africa and Egypt. It is this last reference that we find on this bracelet. The discovery of the tomb of Pharaoh Tutankhamun in 1922 by the British archaeologist Howard Carter, revived a wave of Egyptomania in the creation of jewelry and would affect all major Maisons: Cartier, Van Cleef & Arpels or (as here) Lacloche would succumb to this phenomenon. A jewel like this combines my passion for ancient civilizations and my expertise in jewelry. This piece is now kept at Albion Art, in Japan, which is one of the most incredible collections of jewelry in private hands that I have ever seen. It was with great pleasure that I saw this bracelet again when it was loaned for the retrospective on "Lacloche Jewelers, 1892-1967" at L'ÉCOLE in fall, 2019.

Your next project or the project you dream of working on?

Thanks to my Education in museology, I had the chance to contribute to the content of two previous exhibitions during the Nomadic Schools in Hong Kong. For me these beautiful international projects are moments of encounters with other cultures, in which I like to make complex but fascinating knowledge accessible to the public. This is what I am currently doing in many Talks, where learning takes place with mutual enjoyment.
