Editorial

At the crossroads of art, gemology and craftsmanship, jewelry tells a story: that of men and women whose adventures it has embraced for thousands of years. Through the use of gemstones, formed over millennia, the scope widens and becomes that of the universe itself.

Founded in 2012 with the support of the Maison Van Cleef & Arpels, L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts explores and showcases jewelry, in all its aspects.

This unique school offers an initiation to the arts of jewelry, accessible to all audiences. From the complete beginner to the enlightened amateur, from the curious-minded to the collector, it opens up the fields of an art that has long been reserved for a handful of initiates.

L'ÉCOLE examines this fascinating history in a broad and multidisciplinary fashion, taking an interest in all eras and cultures. From prehistoric to contemporary jewelry, from men's jewelry to tribal designs, rare gems and goldsmithing techniques, L'ÉCOLE promotes the diversity of topics and approaches. It also enables the public to learn about some of the no longer existing jewelry houses like Lacloche, as well as showcasing 20th century female jewelers, and high lighting contemporary artists like Daniel Brush. In short, L'ÉCOLE explores all avenues, including side roads, never hesitating to deconstruct common preconceptions ("jewelry is frivolous", "jewelry is exclusively feminine", "jewelry is necessarily valuable" and more). In each of the topics examined, L'ÉCOLE adopts a fresh, pioneering approach.

Driven by the values of passing on knoweldge, sharing and curiosity, and perpetuating an attitude of benevolence and intellectual and emotional generosity, L'ÉCOLE makes jewelry knowledge accessible to all. Everyone is welcome, there are no prerequisites. Because there is not just one way to learn, the ways of learning offered at L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts are multiple: courses, talks, masterclasses, field trips, exhibitions and publications all help to explore and pass on jewelry culture to an audience as wide as possible. Everyone can learn at their own pace and according to their specific interests.

A department dedicated to research has guaranteed the rigor of the educational content taught, as well as its accuracy and relevance. New courses have therefore been created, exhibitions organized, and books published on little-known or even unpublished topics, such as jewelry designs. A place for the transmission of jewelry culture, L'ÉCOLE also contributes to the construction of jewelry knowledge, with the same level of excellence.

For the past ten years, these initiatives have opened up a territory that remains largely unknown and compartmentalized, providing the public with a privileged insight into the oldest and most intimate of all art forms: the jewelry arts.



A Word From The President

2012 — 2022: 10 YEARS OF SHARING!

L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts was born from a desire to transmit the passion of jewelry culture to the widest possible audience. In a pioneering spirit, with great creative freedom, L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts, supported by Van Cleef & Arpels, was born on February 14, 2012. Bringing together experts in education, art historians, gemologists, jewelry craftsmen and setters, designers, lacquerers and enamelers, this project resonated with the values of excellence and transmission carried by Van Cleef & Arpels, exploring the world of jewelry in its artistic and cultural dimension.

Originally set up one week a month at the Hôtel d'Évreux, Place Vendôme in Paris, L'ÉCOLE offered seven courses in French or English for adults, to which were soon added lectures and introductory workshops for children. L'ÉCOLE quickly became a hit with the public and two years later we moved into the Hôtel de Ségur, 31 rue Danielle Casanova, a private mansion built at the beginning of the 18th century, a stone's throw from Place Vendôme, the historic heart of French jewelry for over a century.

Our courses have been expanded to include the history of jewelry, the world of gemstones and savoir-faire. Unquestionable contents, innovative teaching methods, experience, conviviality and benevolence have been our watchwords since the beginning, the mission of L'ÉCOLE being to allow all those who are curious to learn about jewelry culture.

Since 2013, L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts has been venturing out to meet art and jewelry lovers around the world: we have travelled to Tokyo, Hong Kong, New York and Dubai as part of "Travelling Schools", sessions lasting 2 to 3 weeks during which a full programme of courses, lectures and exhibitions is offered. In addition, from Los Angeles to Singapore, via Milan and Doha, our teachers and experts have also travelled to give lectures in 21 different cities, always in the same spirit of sharing and transmitting jewelry culture.

In 2019, the international influence of L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts accelerated with the opening of a second campus facing the Hong Kong bay, in the heart of West Kowloon Cultural District. Within K11 Musea, the Asia-Pacific L'ECOLE, School of Jewelry is set in a light-filled setting designed by the Japanese architect Sou Fujimoto.

L'ECOLE brings together a team of experts and enthusiasts who are joining the adventure in ever greater numbers. The year 2017 marked the beginning of L'ECOLE's exhibitions. With free admission and a complementary catalogue, they attract an ever-growing audience: to date, more than 100,000 of you have visited our exhibitions in Paris, Hong Kong, Dubai, New York and Tokyo. Also in 2017, the creation of a new department dedicated to Research made it possible to open 10 research programs, on subjects as diverse as the pearl trade between the Middle East and France at the beginning of the 20th century, the history of jewelry design from the Renaissance to the present day, the jewelry of the Comédie-Française, jewelry from the 1960s to the 1980s, or the links between jewelry and literature. The results of this research are used to develop new courses, exhibitions and publications.

A specialized library, unparalleled in the world, which today contains more than 7,000 works on jewelry, gemology and savoir-faire, has also been created. L'ECOLE's heritage collections have grown, with jewelry from all periods that students observe and comment on during jewelry history classes.

From 2016, L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts started to publish books in collaboration with publishing houses or museums. Eleven books and fifteen exhibition catalogues have already been published.

In 2020, the pandemic led us to explore a new way of teaching and keeping in touch with all of you, via online conversations. Now a monthly fixture, each online conversation is offered in different time slots, in French or English, with simultaneous translations in Cantonese, Mandarin and Japanese, so that it can be followed anywhere in the world, regardless of your country of residence or language. Free of charge and always broadcast live, the online conversations are now an integral part of L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts' offerings.

In 2022, as we continue to innovate and explore, we will celebrate 10 years of this beautiful journey with you. The adventure has just begun: we are taking you on a grand tour of the world of jewelry!

EXHIBITION DESIGNING JEWELS

Sometimes reduced to a few pencil lines thrown on a sheet of paper, but often taking on the appearance of a veritable work of art, rich in color and nuance, drawings or designs of jewelry are unique in that they touch us by their beauty, as much as they teach us about the process of creating a piece of jewelry.

Little studied and published, even more rarely exhibited, jewelry designs remain relatively unknown to the general public. Nevertheless, the jewelry design plays an essential role, serving as the reference point for all those involved in the creation of a jewel. Since the Renaissance, the drawing constitutes the first, and indeed, one might say the primordial step, in that it gives life to the idea, and allows the idea to be realized.

It is to this long neglected object—a technical tool serving the artisans involved in the fabrication of the jewelry but also a sensitive work—which L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts wishes to pay tribute, by shining light on its history, technique, authors and status. Following the launch in 2018 of a research pro-

ject into jewelry design and the development of a course on this unique subject, L'ÉCOLE is proud to organize the first exhibition devoted to this theme, explored from a wide variety of perspectives. The selected works broadly cover the 19th century, beginning in the 1760s and ending with the First World War, and were executed by numerous artists and designers, either famous or anonymous, illustrating a great diversity of techniques and uses. All come from the Van Cleef & Arpels Jewelry Culture Fund, set up for research, presentation and educational purposes.

By bringing the jewelry drawing out of the shadows for this exhibition, L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts is fulfilling its mission of sharing jewelry culture.

LACLOCHE EXHIBITION TRAVELS TO HONG KONG!



The Maison Lacloche was one of Paris' celebrated jewelry houses from the Belle Époque period to the 1960s. Established on the rue de la Paix in 1901, it also had boutiques in Madrid and London, as well as branches in Nice, Biarritz, San Sebastián, Cannes and Deauville.

Lacloche Frères, and later Jacques Lacloche, created jewelry for royalty: Queen Victoria of Spain, Edward VII of England, the kings of Greece and Siam, as well as for aristocratic figures such as the Duchess of Westminster, and even Hollywood stars like Grace Kelly. After a first presentation at L'ÉCOLE in Paris in Fall 2019, the exhibition "Lacloche Jewelers" now travels to L'ÉCOLE Asia Pacific in Hong Kong.

Through jewelry, clocks and vanity cases—the Lacloche specialty as well as digitalized archival documents, the retrospective will illustrate various trends, including the naturalism of Art Nouveau and the penchant for the Far East during the Roaring Twenties, the modernism of Art Deco, and the charmingly seductive creations of the 1950s.

Discover 5 key pieces of the exhibition:

Ladies pendant-watch in sculpted rock crystal, gold, platinum, pearls, diamonds, miniature painted on alabaster, signed Paillet, dial covered with facetted amethysts, movement by Vacheron Constantin. Made by the Verger workshop for Lacloche Frères, 1908, Vacheron Constantin Heritage Collection In addition to the refined beauty of the setting, one can appreciate the charming neoclassical style typical of the Belle Époque which miniaturist Fernand Paillet named "Nymphe lutinée par les amours" (Nymph teased by Cupids).

During the Roaring Twenties, the world of fashion and accessories displayed a penchant for the Far East. While Lacloche's designers were influenced by China, they were more likely to find the inspiration for their decorative motifs in Japanese works of art, whose poetry they especially appreciated. Boxes, cigarette cases and vanity cases were the jeweler's specialty.

This bracelet was displayed on the stand of Lacloche Frères at the International Exhibition of Modern Decorative and Industrial Arts in Paris in 1925. The family who purchased this item of jewelry on this occasion kept it in their possession until a recent auction. We can admire the mastery of the jeweler: buff-top cabochon rubies (with the pavilion facetted to provide the stone with greater brilliance and to reflect the light), the open, articulated mount, and the millegrain diamond setting.

The bracelet is a fine example of the jeweler's technical mastery. This inventive and elegant model was highly successful before the war. Jacques Lacloche also made a version of it set with carved emeralds and sapphires.

This is an example of the bold modernity for which Jacques Lacloche had a particular fondness.

MEN'S RINGS EXHIBITION



After a first exhibition held in Paris in the fall of 2018, L'ÉCOLE, School of Jewelry Arts will once again exhibit the breath-taking collection of Yves Gastou's men's rings in Tokyo from January 14 to March 13, at the 21_21 DESIGN SIGHT Gallery 3.

The exhibition showcases almost three hundred rings, ranging from 17th century Venetian Doge rings to those of 1970s' American bikers, as well as antique rings from ancient Egypt to 19th century vanities, and 18th century enamels to contemporary artists' rings...

The exhibition is divided into 5 sections:

History

Men have worn rings since ancient times. The oldest rings known to date come from Mesopotamia and Egypt, where many examples have been discovered decorated with scarabs (beetles) and hieroglyphics. From 1820 onwards, artists from the Romantic period set off on tours of Italy and Greece in order to complete their cultural education. These trips were referred to as the "Grand Tour". Young aristocrats discovered ancient sites and brought back souvenirs. The jewelry worn by these gentlemen reflected the neoclassical esthetic. Rings were decorated with intaglios (the engraving of fine stones), cameos (relief designs on the different colored layers of a cabochon), and old, unearthed coins.

Gothic

In fashion from the Romantic period in Europe from 1820 to 1880, the Neo-Gothic comprised an artistic rediscovery of the Middle Ages, linked on the one hand to the growing fascination for Gothic cathedrals, hence the popularity of Victor Hugo's novel The Hunchback of Notre-Dame in which the eponymously titled cathedral is celebrated, and on the other hand, to the public infatuation with chivalrous knights, from the legend of King Arthur to the shining armor of Joan of Arc, along with castles and the Crusades.



Christian Mystique

The collection of religious rings presented here makes it possible to follow the main stages of the Christian religion over time. Rather simple in decoration at the time of the early Christians. these rings were adorned with the most beautiful precious stones as the Church developed and gained in wealth in the 19th century. Begun in the late 1930s and supported in particular by Father Couturier around 1950, the revival of Christian art has changed the perception of rings. The Vatican Council II, completed in 1965, definitively modified the esthetics of episcopal rings. They are now less extravagant, and more pared down in their modernity. The rings' changing ornamentation and form bear witness to the evolutions and transformations of the Church. Along with the miter, a symbol of saintliness, and the crosier symbolizing the pastor's mission, the ring, sometimes accompanied by a pectoral cross, is one of the three traditional symbols of the episcopal office, presented to the bishop during his consecration. It materializes the bishop's mystical union with the church and his fidelity to God.



Vanitas

Since the dawn of time, man has been both fascinated and terrified by death. Mourning rings, bikers' rings in the style of Hell's angels, or "danses macabres" inspired by the Renaissance, many artists have explored it in their work. Perhaps they do so in order to chase away their fears, as evidenced by the expression "Memento Mori" (meaning "remember you are going to die"), or maybe it is proof that we are not afraid of the future, captured by the "Carpe Diem" philosophy ("seize the day").

Eclecticism

Artists' rings, fantastical bestiary, curiosities, travels, religions and esoterism, these rings confirm the desire to learn, an insatiable force of discovery, a quest for the expression of beauty. This search had no limits nor was it confined to a single territory and brought the esthete to explore all spheres of creation.

IN FRANCE FROM 1850 TO THE PRESENT BY REMI VERLET (French publication)

L'ÉCOLE is publishing a reference work for professionals and amateurs of silver, goldsmithery and jewelry: the Dictionnaires des joailliers, bijoutiers et orfèvres en France, de 1850 à nos jours (Dictionary of Jewelers and Goldsmiths in France from 1850 to the present).

The fruit of a veritable research project carried out over ten years, this publication comprises two volumes: a dictionary and directory.


-The dictionary features approximately 40,000 entries of jewelers, jewelry-makers, silver and goldsmiths, silver gilders and gilders, chasers and other related trades, as well as creators and designers... and is accompanied by the descriptions of 25,000 hallmarks, including 9,000 reproduced in the form of stylized drawings.

-The second volume offers an index or directory allowing users to find the artisans referred to in the first volume based on a description of their hallmark.

The publication of this work is significant, both in terms of the work's content and ambition. The dictionary not only brings together some 40,000 names of artisans working with metal between 1850 and today, it provides a biographical note for each of them, including dates, successive addresses, name of their boutique, specialties of the manufacturer, the possible houses for which they worked, a brief description of their hallmark, date of deposit, and documentary references. This work constitutes a new working tool and reference work for professionals and amateurs interested in contemporary goldsmithery and jewelry (since 1850).




